

Infiormation For Players and Local Rules

- 1. Correct clothing must be worn at all times on course ie. shirts with collars; enclosed shoes and socks; neat and tidy appearance in clubhouse.
- 2. Playing time: Players are expected to complete each nine (9) holes in approximately two hours.
- 3. Equipment: Each player is to have his or her own bag and clubs.
- 4. Fairways are defined by closely mown surface.
- 5. Distance markers: Yellow markers 150m, Blue markers 100m, Red 200m to the centre of the green.
- 6. Immovable obstructions: Irrigation equipment, distance markers, course signage, seats and bins. If an immovable obstruction interferes with a player's stance or area of intended swing, the ball may be lifted and dropped in accordance with rule 24-2b(i)
- 7. See local rules board for other local rules. Eg ground under repair etc
- 8. Out of bounds:
 - (i) Is defined by the white markers on holes 1,2,5,6,15 and 18
 - (ii) Internal out of bounds while playing hole 8 defined by short mown fairway and green of hole 6 including all ground beyond
- 9. Mobile phones to be switched to silent during play.
- 10. Motorised buggies must not be taken:
 - (i) Within 5 metres of all greens
 - (ii) Off the fairway or designated tracks
 - (iii) Onto teeing ground
 - (iv) Onto roadway or top car park
- 11. When a player's ball has not been found or is known or virtually certain to be out of bounds, the player may proceed as follows rather than proceeding under stroke and distance.

For <u>two penalty strokes</u>, the player may take relief by dropping the original ball or another ball in this relief area (see Rule 14.3):

<u>Two Estimated Reference Points:</u> (a) Ball Reference Point: The point where the original ball is estimated to have: \cdot Come to rest on the course, or \cdot Last crossed the edge of the course boundary to go out of bounds. (b) Fairway Reference Point: The point of fairway of the hole being played that is nearest to the ball reference point, but is not nearer the hole than the ball reference point.

For purposes of this Local Rule, "fairway" means any area of grass in the general area that is cut to fairway height or less.

If a ball is estimated to be lost on the course or last crossed the edge of the course boundary short of the fairway, the fairway reference point may be a grass path or a teeing ground for the hole being played cut to fairway height or less.

Once the player puts a ball in play under this Local Rule:

- The original ball that was lost or out of bounds is no longer in play and must not be played.
- This is true even if the ball is found on the course before the end of the three-minute search time (see Rule 6.3b).

But the player may not use this option to take relief for the original ball when:

- That ball is known or virtually certain to have come to rest in a penalty area, or
- The player has played another ball provisionally under penalty of stroke and distance (see Rule 18.3).

A player may use this option to take relief for a provisional ball that has not been found or is known or virtually certain to be out of bounds.

Bottle tops are a hazard to machinery.

Temporary Local Rule:

Preferred lies on fairways 6 and 10 ONLY due to water and animal damage.
